Attraction: A Spiritual Approach

I recently attended a meeting I have made part of my regular meeting rotation called Dinner with Bill. Our practice is to choose a topic from "As Bill Sees It". We read the topic and then share our experience, strength & hope. That evening's topic was found on page 14 entitled "Newcomer Problems". One of the focal points was the experience of being hurt or confused when our advice gets rejected. The meeting was called to an end just before I got a chance to share. I would consider this offering the written version of what I would have said.

Many of our members shared their frustrations about trying to arm the newcomer with some of the significant advantages found in the solution to our common problem. There were good stories, too. I heard gratitude from one member who shared about their entire immediate family participating in the fellowship of AA and the joys and rewards associated with that experience. This member was decidedly blessed with the gift of observing spiritual growth among the people she loved.

Another member shared about some of the hurt and confusion entailed with attempts to chisel this program into the mind of a newcomer and suffering alcoholic. Chiseling is hard work and contempt prior to investigation makes the mind of a suffering recipient completely chiselproof. As we went around the room, I noticed the sentiment of disappointment prevailing among those of us stymied in our attempts to carry the message. There were many of us.

As a person having some sales experience, I have become a student of the soft sell rather than any other method. One disadvantage we AA's have in carrying the message is that our track records are not the examples of a life well lived. Newcomers in the habit of comparing rather than identifying pick up on this and disqualify us before the first initial of our last name gets uttered. "A man convinced against his will is of the same opinion still." (Ben Franklin)

One young newcomer, filled with resentment, dealing with wreckage of the past, mandated to be in a room full of drunks, having to obtain written proof of his attendance from these drunks, finding himself in the company of wellintentioned AA's, is unconvinced and apprehensive. Accosted by waves of long term sobriety and cornered with the enthusiasm of a drawn out mini-lead, the newcomer wonders what kind of insane system of remediation he has fallen prey to? Our members disguise their hurt and rejection of the results by mumbling that old mantra: "This is for people who want it, not people who need it".

How do these opposing emotions and attitudes ever find harmony when inadvertently arrayed against one another? Sometimes they don't and by the rule of unintended consequences, a person's life gets steered in a direction that becomes beyond recall. There are no referees or supervisors in these situations. One hopes that the will of the collective is good enough and strong enough to impart healing.

There are a couple of concepts I like to draw upon that are signposts in the traffic of recovery. The first is the often said tenet: "the newcomer is the most important person at any meeting." Another concept is one of our rewards: "we will lose interest in selfish things and gain interest in our fellows". A confluence of these two concepts provides a watershed moment. I choose to engage the newcomer on grounds with which he is most familiar; his recent history. I offer up the following: "I hate DUI's. What an expensive inauguration into AA! When I got mine, my whole family found out. I was fit for embalming. How about you?" I pose the questions in a friendly way, with a smile and without challenge. I wait for the response without interrupting.

The communique is not risk-free. The newcomer may not want to talk about things. The point is that the opportunity was proffered. The risk is worth the reward. The vulnerability takes courage. The attitude is not brashness, it is humility.

A couple of things happen. I have let him know that I am intimate with his situation. I have let him know that I need him to tell me that it is OK. Ownership of failure is mine, and I ask for his validation. We both share a common experience. I am asking and encouraging him to share his story. I have put my chisel away and drawn myself to him, offering up my vulnerability. I am interested in his story. Hopefully, he will drop his guard and open up. In this way, I will get to revisit fresh pain and humiliation, reminders of how I arrived. Keeping the pain fresh is the antidote for the quick forgetter. A newcomer may not have sage advice on sobriety, but can sure remind me why I want to stay sober. The newcomer's recent experience gets translated into wisdom when artfully extracted & refined.

The art of harvesting the newcomer's fresh experience for the benefit of ourselves takes a thousand meetings, but only twelve steps. There is no condescension; rather, there is an exchange of assets beneficial to both parties. By feeling understood, the newcomer walks away with an appreciation of his experience with AA. By listening, the old timer has reinforced the feeling of gratitude for not having to experience the recent humiliation of the newcomer. The germination of a future friendship is at hand.
